THE CHAPEL SERVICE ON SUNDAYS 6.15pm CHORAL EVENSONG

All members of College, their guests, and the public are welcome at our services of Choral Evensong or Eucharist held each Sunday during Full Term. The Evensong service is in the beautiful Oxford tradition of the Book of Common Prayer with choral responses. Those present are warmly invited to sherry or juice and supper in College following each service.

A CHORAL EUCHARIST (also called MASS and HOLY COMMUNION) is celebrated in Chapel once or more per term on a Sunday evening.

We are an inclusive Christian community, accepting one another as equally made in God's image. Those uncertain about their beliefs will find space without pressure in our services, alongside those whose faith is deepening. Those without religious beliefs, and members of other faiths, are also very welcome. The Chapel is open daily for quiet prayer and meditation. Those of all faiths and none are invited to use our MULTI-FAITH PRAYER AND QUIET ROOM located in the Wolfson Building at the foot of Staircase 3.

St Hugh's College Chapel remains a steadfast place of prayer, welfare support, music, and learning for all members of College, their guests, and the public. Some of our services in Chapel each Sunday at 6.15pm may be simultaneously broadcast on our dedicated Facebook page, and later uploaded to our YouTube channel. EASTER ENCOUNTERS

Among the most dramatic narratives in the Bible are the Easter encounters of Jesus' disciples. We find in the stories, perhaps to our surprise, that even those closest to Jesus found it quite hard to believe the notion that he might somehow be alive again after the crucifixion. In other words, they were just like the rest of us. The Easter encounters are presented as having happened in the most ordinary of settings, too. No halos, heavenly voices, or lightning to make things clearer. Mary Magdalene was in a cemetery when at first she mistook Jesus for the gardener. Two others met him along a road and initially they thought him a stranger woefully ignorant of their troubles. Thomas considered him an imposter until he examined Jesus' wounds for himself. Faith for most people is like that of Thomas – involving study, wrestling with difficult questions, and plenty of time, patience, and grace. This term our speakers, from several sectors and even faith backgrounds, will help us along by sharing from their own encounters and rich understandings.

Adrian Moore is Professor of Philosophy in the University of Oxford, teaching and publishing from St Hugh's College as Tutorial Fellow in Philosophy.

Erica Payne is the Great Britain Director for the international registered charity Innovista, which works to support the 14 million people in the UK living in poverty.
